Certain improvements have been made in the physical condition of the school buildings to keep them in servicable order. The most important change was made at the North Chapel School where an oil burner was installed to replace the old wood stove. This installation has proved to be entirely adequate and satisfactory. It is recommended that similar oil burning equipment be installed in the Burnham School, Iron Bridge School and Durell School this year. The situation as to toilets and water supply continues to be inadequate and unsanitary.

Two school buses have been operated, one at each end of the Town This transportation has been very satisfactory and has provided dependable service to the children living more than one mile from a school.

All teachers who taught for us last year returned again in September, 1949. Their work has been done in a consciencious manner and good results have been obtained. As long as we have the inadequacies of the unimproved one room rural school we cannot expect to provide maximum school opportunities for the children. However, the Town has supplied teachers generouslv with books and supplies.

All buildings are now used practically to capacity. Any increase in the number of children will demand increased facilities, or tuition payment to another Town for grades seven and eight. In the event that the seventh and eighth grades were sent out of town the Irving School should be closed.

The great need is for a new modern consolidated six room building. Citizens and Town Officers have been giving much time and thought to this question. The State Legislature has granted the Town the right to establish a School District for the purpose of increasing its debt limit in order to build a school. The Town will consider this problem at the Annual Meeting.

An alternate plan has been suggested by which partial consolidation might be brought about by renovating the facilities

of the Town Hall. Increased transportation cost is involved in either consolidation or conveyance to another Town.

Because of the limited facilities and large enrollment there is no sub-primary grade. The entrance age for Grade One is six years on or before December 31, following the September entrance.

I wish to extend my appreciation to School Committee, teachors and citizens for their continued cooperation.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH

NURSE, 1949

North Kennebunkport

During 1949 North Kennebunkport has been free of any serious epidemics. Is it because of more vigilance in the control of communicable diseases or better protection? We would like to think that both play an important part.

During the year monthly child health conferences were held and were attended by a total of 91 infants and pro-school children. Physical examinations were given to 18 infants and 38 pre-school children who took advantage of these conferences; 28 were protected against diphtheria; 14 against whooping cough, and 20 against tetanus; 33 smallpox vaccinations were given. Because of this protection there should be less incidence of these diseases in the community.

Physical examinations were given to 40 school children. Only five parents accompanied their children for these examinations. I would like to extend an invitation to all parents to accompany their children when the physical examinations are given. This should serve as an educational experience for the child in teaching him to assume some responsibility for his own health. No treatment is offered and if any defects are found the children an referred to their family physician. Forty-two visits were made to the various schools and 48 teacher-nurse conferences were held. Teachers have been very helpful in observing the children and referring any who have health problems. Fourteen home visits were made to cases referred by the teachers.

Audiometer tests were given to 86 children. Of this group three were found to have some hearing loss.

A total of 36 visits were made to prenatal cases and 22 visits were made after delivery. Health supervision of infants and pre-schools is a very important phase of the program. Home visits were made to 76 infants and 206 pre-school children.

There has been an increase in the bedside nursing program during the year; 131 home nursing visits and 26 office visits were made.

Under the sponsorship of your local Health Council blood typing was done and we now have a list of potential blood donors who have responded very well. More information about this service may be obtained by calling the nurse at Kennebunkport 470.

It is necessary for the nurse working alone to have contact with others engaged in the same field and I have attended monthly staff meetings at the district office in Portland. Here a continuous program for staff education is carried on. I also attended the meeting of the American Public Health Association which was held in New York in October. I hope to give better service to the community because of the knowledge and stimulation gained at these meetings.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all who have helped in the success of this program. I am especially grateful to the Selectmen, Health Officer, the Teaching Staff, Superintendent of Schools, and especially to the Members of the Health Council for their active support of the program. I hope the services will continue to expand during 1950.

The State Law requires the local Health Officer to provide annually free small-pox vaccination to all citizens of the Town and inoculation against diphtheria and whooping cough to all children under 12 years of age—all charges to be paid by the Town.

In accordance with this law we vaccinated—for Small-pox 9, Diphtheria 10, combination Diphtheria and Whooping Cough and Tetanus 6. Total cost to the Town—\$20.78.

AN ACT to Incorporate the North Kennebunkport

School District.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

See. 1. Incorporation: name: purposes. Subject to the provisions of sections 7 and 9 hereof', the inhabitants of and the territory within the town of North Kennebunkport are hereby created a body politic and corporate under the name of "North Kennebunkport School District" for the purpose of acquiring property within said town for school and related athletic and recreational purposes; for the purpose of erecting, enlarging, repairing, equipping and maintaining on said property a school building or school buildings and related athletic and redreational facilities; for the purpose of completing , grading, furnishing, rebuilding, renovating, and otherwise bettering the condition of any or all buildings withing said town used for school purposes of which may hereafter be used for school purposes; for the purpose of leasing or letting any property of said district to said town: for the purpose of receiving, accepting and holding gifts, grants or devises of property, real, personal or mixed, to be used for school and related athletic and recreational purposes: all for the benefit of the inhabitants of said district:

Sec. 2. Trustees, powers and duties; limitations. All the afrairs of said district (except, election of teachers who shall serve in the said schools and the fixing of their salaries, the course of study, the terms of school and other matters pertaining to the education of pupils, which matters shall be controlled by the school board of the town of North Kennebunkport) shall be managed by a board of 3 trustees who shall be elected as is hereinafter provided . The board of trustees, acting for said

district, shall have and exercise all the powers and authorities necessary to carry out the purposes of this act and the powers and authorities granted herein.

Sec. 3. Trustees; how elected, tenure of office, organization of board; officers; vacancies compensation; reports. As soon as may be after the acceptance of this act as hereinafter provided, the municipal officers of the town of North Kennebunkport shall appoint 3 trustees of said district, to hold office as follows respectively: 1 until the next annual town meeting; 1 until the 2nd annual town meeting and 1 until the 3rd annual town meeting; and thereafter, at each annual town meeting. 1 trustee shall be elected to serve until the annual town meeting occurring 3 years later. When any trustee ceases to be a resident of said district he vacates the office of trustee. Any vacancy upon the board of trustees occurring because of change of residence of trustee, resignation, death or any cause except normal expiration of term of office shall be filled by the municipal officers of the town of North Kennebunkport in the same manner in which the original board was appointed and for the unexpired portion of the term of the vacant office. All trustees shall be eligible for reelection or reappointment.

The 1st meeting of the board of trustees shall be held as soon as convenient after they have been appointed as above provided. At this original meeting, they shall elect from their membership a president, a clerk and a treasurer, shall adopt a corporate seal, may ordain and establish such bylaws consistent with the laws of the state as are necessary for their own convenience and the proper management of the affairs of said district, and may do all other acts, matters and things necessary to perfect their organization. Within two weeks after each annual town meeting of the town of North Kennebunkport, the trustees shall meet for the purpose of electing a president, clerk and treasurer for the ensuing year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The trustees shall have the right and authority to employ and fix compensation of such officers and agents as they may deem necessary for the proper conduct and managemen' of the affairs of the district.

The trustees shall serve without compensation, except that the treasurer may receive for his services an amount to be fixed by the board of trustees not in excess of \$100 per year. The

treasurer shall give bond to the district in such sum and with such sureties as the trustees may determine, which bond shall remain in the custody of the president. The treasurer's salary, bond premiums and all expenses of the district shall be paid from the bonds of the district.

At the close of each fiscal year of said district, which shall coincide with the fiscal year of the town of North Kennebunkport, the trustees shall make a detailed report of their doings, of the financial condition of said district, of the physical condition of its property, and also of such other matters and things pertaining to said district as shall show the inhabitants thereof how said trustees are fulfilling the duties and obligations of their trust. Such report shall be made and filed with municipal officers of the town of North Kennebunkport on or before February 15 of each year.

Sec. 4. How financed. To procure funds for the purpose of this act, and for such other expenses as may be necessary to carry out said purposes, the said trustees are hereby authorized from time to time to borrow money and to issue bonds and notes of the district therefor, but shall not incur a total indebtedness exceeding the sum of \$30,000. Each bond and note shall have inscribed upon its face the words "North Kennebunkport School District", shall bear interest at such rates as the trustees shall determine, payable semi-annually, and shall be subject to such other provisions as the trustees shall determine. Said bonds and notes may be issued to mature serially or made to run for such periods as said trustees may determine, but none of which shall run for a longer period than 30 years from the date of the original issue thereof. All bonds and notes may be made callable at the discretion of the trustees of the district. All bonds and notes issued by said district shall be signed by the treasurer and countersigned by the president of said district, and if coupon bonds be issued, each coupon shall be attested by the facsimile signatures of the president and treasurer printed thereon. Said bonds and notes shall be legal obligations of said district which is hereby declared to be a quasi-municipal corporation within the meaning of section 132 of chapter 49 of the revised statutes, and all the provisions of said section shall be applicable thereto. The said bonds and notes shall be legal investments for savings banks. The said trustees are hereby author-

ized and empowered to enter into such an agreement with the state or Federal government, or any agency thereof, or any corporation or board authorized by the state or federal government to loan money or otherwise assist in the financing of such projects as this school district is authorized to carry out, as may be necessary or desirable to accomplish the purposes of this act.

Sec. 5. Sinking fund; refunding bonds provided for. In case any bonds or notes at any time issued are made to run for a period of years, as distinguished from serial maturity, the trustees shall establish a sinking fund for such bonds or notes for the purpose of redeeming the same when they become, due. The amount to be paid annually into such sinking fund shall not beless than 4% of the total principal amount of such bonds or note originally issued. In addition to such annual sinking fund payment, the trustees shall have authority from time to time to add to any such sinking funds of said district not required for other purpose. Funds in any sinking fund may be deposed in any national bank. savings bank or trust company within the state or may be invested in whole or in part in any bonds of the United States, or of the State of Maine, or of any political subdivision thereof, as the trustees may determine. Interest received on any funds so invested shall be added to the sinking fund. When and if the amount accumulated in any sinking fund, together with interest received or to be received thereon, shall be sufficient to pay at maturity or, at the option of the trustees, to redeem the bonds or notes for the benefit of which sinking fund was established, all further payments to such sinking fund shall cease.

Whenever any bonds or notes issued by said district may become due or can be purchased or called for redemptions by said district on favorable terms, said trustees, if sufficient funds have accumulated in the sinking fund provided therefor, shall pay, purchase, or redeem said bonds or notes and cancel them. Tin no case shall bonds orr notes so paid, purchased or redeemed, and cancelled, be reissued.

In case the amount in any sinking fund shall not be sufficient to pay the total amount when due of the bonds and notes for which such sinking fund was provided, or in case it shall become desirable in the opinion of the trustees to call for redemption any outstanding bonds or notes and to issue new bonds or notes

in their stead, authority is hereby granted to said trustees to redeem so many of said original bonds or notes as cannot be paid or redeemed from the sinking fund provided therefor, if any, but in no case shall such new bonds or notes mature more than 30 years from the original date of issue of the original bonds or notes so refunded.

Sec. 6. Assessment of taxes authorized to meet indebtedness; how collected; procedure. The trustees of the "North Kennebunkport School District" shall determine what sum is required each year for sinking fund payments, or if the bonds or notes authorized by this act shall be issued to mature serially, what sum is required each year to meet the bonds and notes falling due, and what sum is required each year to meet other necessary expenses in the district, and shall each year, before the 1st day of April, issue their warrant in the same form as the warrant of the treasurer of the state for taxes, with proper changes, to the assessors of the town of North Kennebunkport, requiring that they assess the total sum so determined upon the taxable polls and estates within said district and to commit their assessments to the constable or collector of said town of North Kennebunkport, who shall have all authority and powers to collect said taxes as is vested by law to collect state, county and municipal taxes. On or before the 31st day of December of the year in which said tax is so levied, the treasurer of said town shall pay the amount of the tax so assessed against said district to the treasurer of said district. In case of a failure on the part of the treasurer of the town to pay said sum, or in case of his failure to pay any part thereof on or before said 31st day of December of the year m which said tax is levied, the treasurer of said district may issue his warrant for the amount of said tax or so much thereof as shall then remain unpaid to the sheriff of York county, requiring him to levy by distress and sale on real and personal property of any of the inhabitants of said district, and the sheriff or either or any of his deputies shall execute said warrant except as is otherwise provided herein. The same authority as is vested in county officials for the collection of county taxes, under the provisions of the revised statutes, is hereby vested in the trustees of said district in relation to the collection of taxes within said district.

Sec. 7. Provisions for termination of the board of trustees. At such lime as the school building or buildings and related athletic and recreational facilities shall have been completed, equipped and occupied by pupils of said district, and the board of trustees of the district shall have discharged all of its principal obligations, and the property of said district shall be free and clear of ail indebtedness, the board of trustees shall automatically cease to function and all of the duties, management, care and maintenance of the property of said district shall revert to the school board of the town of North Kennebunkport, or such other board as may at that time have jurisdiction over similar school property, and the then president and treasurer of said district shall cause to be executed, signed and delivered, a good and sufficient deed of all the property of said district to the town of North Kennebunkport. All money, if any, remaining in the treasury of said district, at the time said trustees cease to function, shall be given to the town treasurer of the town of North Kennebunkport. This money shall be used only for school purposes and shall be kept separate from all other money until authorized by the selectmen of the year of North Kennebunkport' to be expended for one or more of the purposes stated in this act.

Sec. 8. Authority to receive property from the town of North Kennebunkport. The "North Kennebunkport School District" is hereby authorized to receive from the town of North Kennebunkport. and said town of North Kennebunkport is hereby authorized to transfer and convey to said district, any property, real, personal or mixed, now or hereafter owned or held by the town of North Kennebunkport for school purposes, and any sums of money or other assets which the said town of North Kennebunkport has raised or may raise, either by taxation, borrowing or otherwise, for school purposes. Before transferring and conveying any of said property or turning over any of said funds or assets, the municipal officers of the town of North Kennebunkport shall be duly authorized to do so by a majority vote of the legal voters present at any annual or special town meeting, the call for which shall have given notice of the proposed action.

Sec. 9. Referendum; effective dale. This act shall take effect 90 days alter the adjournment of this legislature, only for the purpose of permitting its submission to the legal voters of the territory embraced within the limits of said district at any regular election or at any special election called and held for that purpose, or at any election called for the purpose of voting upon any state referendum. Such election shall he held not later than 1 year after the effective date of this act and shall be called, advertised and conducted according to the law relating to municipal elections; provided, however, that the board of registration in said town of North Kennebunkport shall not be required to prepare for posting or the town clerk to post a new list of voters, and for the purpose of registration of voters, said board shall be in session 1 hour preceding such election. The town clerk shall prepare the required ballots on which he shall reduce the subject matter of this act to the following question: "Shall the Act to Incorporate the North Kennebunkport School District be accepted?" and the voters shall indicate by a cross or check mark placed over the words "Yes" or "No" their opinion of the same. The result in said district shall be declared by the municipal officers of the town of North Kennebunkport and due certificate thereof filed by the town clerk with the secretary of state. This act shall take effect for all the purposes thereof immediately upon its acceptance by a majority of the legal voters voting at said meeting: provided that the total number of votes cast for and against the acceptance of this act at said meeting equals or exceeds 20% of the total vote for all candidates for governor in said town at the next previous gubenatorial election.

To see if the Town will vote that for the purpose of procuring a temporary loan to and for the use of the Town of North Kennebunkport, to pay the indebtedness of said Town, due or to become due duringthe present municipal year, to be paid out of the money raised by taxation during the present municipal year, the Town Treasurer be and hereby is authorized and directed to borrow from time to time a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate, ten thousand dollars, and to execute and deliver the note or notes of the Town therefor, signed by the Town Treasurer and countersigned by the Municipal Officers of the Town.
