In accordance with Chapter 16, Section 3, Revised Statutes of 1944 and at your request, the records of the Town of North Kennebunkport have been audited by Auditors M.G Alien and C. G. Hawes for the period February 12, 1946 to January 31, 1947 inclusive.

The examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances and included all procedures which were considered necessary. Insofar as could be ascertained within the scope of the examination, the financial transactions of the town appear to have been appropriately handled, with such exceptions as may be noted in the accompanying comments.

CASH

The cash available tor current expenditure amounted to \$2,430.85 at January 31, 1947. This reconciled with the bank as follows:

Analysis of receipts and deposits in the bank indicated that all cash recorded as received had been deposited m the bank It was ascertained that all disbursements had been made by check and all warrants had been paid in full.

Accounts Receivable

This account represents 1944 and 1945 items. No reserve has been set up as these accounts are m the process of collection.

Taxes Receivable

The 1946 commitment book was added and checked to the valuation book, and found in agreement. The Assessors discovered, after making the commitment, that the overlay was in excess of the legal limit of 5 of the appropriations plus State and County taxes. Special abatements amounting to \$425.80 were made to each individual property taxpayer to legalize the tax. The detail of these abatements may be found on Schedule A-10.

All collections as recorded by the Tax Collector were traced to the records of the Treasurer.

Tax Liens

The tax liens at January 31, 1947, amounted to \$945.67. The detail of liens appears on Schedule A-12. Liens supporting this detail were found on file and examined.

Tax Deeds

All deeds, the detail of which appears on Schedule A-13, were found on file.

Tax Acquired Property

During the year, there were transfers from taxes receivable of \$20.65 and tax liens of \$178.50, and sales of \$641.80.

Investments—Bridge Account

The savings account representing this fund was verified by examination of the bank pass book.

Due Governmental Agencies

In the examination of withholding tax deductions, it was found no records were available to determine which appropriation account should be charged, other than the school account. It was, therefore, necessary to charge surplus with \$90.68, the amount withheld.

The Teachers' Retirement Fund deductions were examined, and \$12.00 was found to have been withheld in error. This has been set up as an account payable, and appears on Schedule A-7.

The appropriated surplus represents the balances of certain appropriation accounts which are carried forward to the ensuing year. The unappropriated surplus was increased by \$3,029.40 during the year. The complete analysis of the change in this account may be found on Exhibit E of this report.

Trust Funds

The savings account of the trust fund was verified by an examination of the bank pass book. The income from this fund was withdrawn and is in the general fund, as shown on Exhibit A.

General

The 1946 excise tax receipts, No. 92 to 378, and the 1947 excise tax receipts, No. 1 to 77, were checked from the copies of the receipts, and all monies had been deposited with the Treasurer. Of the total amount, there was \$880.63 applied to the tax commitment, leaving a balance of \$206.81 which was carried forward to the 1947/48 year.

In order to reconcile the records of the Selectmen to the cash balance, it was necessary to check all receipts and disbursements in detail.

A detailed check was made of vouchers and payrolls and all examined appeared to be reasonable and proper charges.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE FOR 1947, NORTH KENNEBUNKPORT

Under the Enabling Act North Kennebunkport offers to its citizens the services of a public health nurse.

The nurse started her duties here on May 1st The program will vary according to the needs of the community.

The public health nurse through a teaching program Promotes mental and physical health by: Home visits to mothers, infants, preschool and school children, and adults Since Maine has a high maternal and infant mortality rate' we would like to put more emphasis on these two services in the hope that we may improve these conditions.

During 1947 sixteen expectant mothers were visited and a total number of 29 visits were made. It is our aim to find these cases as early in their pregnancy as possible, so that they may be under good medical care and be instructed to guard against abnormal conditions that might occur.

Fourteen new infants were admitted to service and a total number of 35 visits were made. During the first year of life it is important to visit these cases once a month to help to detect any abnormal conditions and help with problems that might arise.

Child Health Conferences were started in June and have been held every month on the third Tuesday from 3:00 to 5:00 P. M. During October the conference was canceled because of the forest fires. The services of a doctor have been obtained for these conferences and the following services are offered: On the first visit to the Child Health Conference each child is given a complete Physical examination and if any defects are found they are referred to their family physician or to some clinic. Immunization against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus, and vaccination against smallpox is offered and given at the cost of the serum. It would be desirable and is our aim to have all babies in North Kennebunkport immunized against these diseases since we have protection against them, so that when they enter school they will have been fully protected. We have had very good attendance and below are some of the statistics:

You will note that only 4 children were protected against tetanus or lockjaw. Since this is a rural area and there is more danger of injury from puncture wounds that might result in tetanus, we would like to have all the children protected. There were 18 deaths in Maine Trom Tetanus in the last five years. The unfortunate thing about these deaths is that immunization against this disease is available but was not taken advantage of. One of these deaths was that of a little eight-year old girl from Portland. This could have been avoided if she had been immunized.

During 1948 we are planning to develop the school health program and have arranged for a physician to give complete physical examinations to selected grades. Parents should be present when their children are being examined in order that the maximum benefit may be obtained.

The Health Council which has just been organized and consists of citizens of North Kennebunkport who are interested in promoting better health in the community, have been very helpful in developing this program.

Bedside nursing care is offered and a small fee is charged for these services (\$1.00 per visit. To date \$17.50 has been collected in fees).

The nurse receives her calls to visit a patient from the doctor or from the family. A doctor must be in attendance for the nurse to continue her visits. The nurse may be reached by calling Kennebunkport 470 between 8:30 and 9:30 A. M. and 1:00 and 1:30 P. M. Monday through Friday.

The total number of home visits made was 196. The total number of visits made to schools was 26 and the number of follow-up visits to school children was 25.

I take this opportunity to thank all who have assisted in any way to help make the public health nursing program a success. I am especially grateful to the Teaching

Staff, the Superintendent of Schools, and members of the School Committee for their understanding and cooperation in the school health work. I also thank the selectmen and members of the Health Council who have helped in so many ways.

Entrance Age

The State Law provides that children may enter the sub-primary grade (when such a grade is provided) if they

have attained age five on or before October 15, following the opening of school in September. Children may enter grade one provided they have attained age six on or before December 31, following the opening of school in September.

I recommend that the sub-primary grade be eliminated. In a rural school the teacher must spread her time over many grades. The amount of time required by a subprimary child cannot be justified in terms of the sacrifice in time taken from the upper grades.

Any advantages which sub-primary children might lose by not attending school can easily be overcome during grade one.

Transportation

Bus transportation was furnished in the south end of the Town for the first time beginning in September 1947. It has proved to be very satisfactory. Bus transportation has been furnished at the north end of the Town for a number of years.

If the present schools are operated another year, a thirty-one pupil capacity bus could transport all the children living beyond the one mile limit of the North Chapel, Durell and Burnham Schools. A careful arrangement of route and time schedule would make this possible. This bus might be provided either by a private contract with owner to furnish transportation for three years or by a Town owned bus. The State Equalization Law provides that the State will aid in the capital investment up to 50 of the cost under certain conditions. I recommend private ownership under contract with the Town for three years. A mileage rate or per pupil rate may be established. Under private ownership the Town is relieved of responsibility for driver insurance, garage, maintenance and all other problems connected with the bus. The cost will be about the same under either type of ownership. If a change is made by way of consolidating schools two busses will be required.

Proposed Changes in Physical Plant

The present outmoded school buildings demand immediate attention at least in the matter of repairs. It might be well to take a long range view of possible future developments. Six classrooms will doubtless provide sufficient school room space, at least for the immediate future.

For the most part, the surrounding towns are not in a position to absorb pupils from North Kennebunkport. Therefore it will be necessary for the Town to provide its own school facilities. The following plans are possible methods of solving the problem of school housing.

Plan No. 1

Place the present buildings in satisfactory repair. All schools need outside paint. Most of them should be painted inside. All need work on foundations and all should have new coal or oil burning stoves. Miscellaneous carpenter work should be done in all buildings. The schools will still be without a water supply for satisfactory drinking water, washing facilities and toilet facilities.

Plan No. 2

Consolidate the present buildings into two units. A three room unit to be established at the Burnham School and a three room unit to be established at the Durell School, with the possibility of using the Town Hall. This change would close Irving, North Chapel and Iron Bridge and would provide a partial consolidation with the attendant advantages. There would be no object in this change unless the program for the installation of a water supply, toilet facilities and proper heating be included. This plan would also call for the operation of two busses of thirtyone pupil capacity each. The consolidation of the schools at the north end of the Town, with the establishment of a three room unit at the Town Hall might well be the first step in this program.

Plan No. 3

The real need of the Town is a consolidated six room modern school centrally located and properly equipped. This building might well include a clinic, lunch facilities, Town Hall and Selectmens' office. All pupils could be transported with two school busses.

Conclusion

We have been fortunate in retaining the services of a few teachers of experience and ability. We have engaged recently some new teachers who have already proved their competence. Books and supplies have been in adequate supply. A standard testing program in the Spring of 1946 indicated good achievement standards.

I wish to thank the School Committee, teachers and all other persons with whom I have been associated in North Kennebunkport for the friendly cooperation which I have received.

WARRANT

For Annual Meeting, March 1st., 1948 STATE OF MAINE

County of York, ss.

To ELSIE BURGESS, Constable of the Town of North Kennebunkport, in said County: GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of North Kennebunkport, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall, in said town, on the first day of March, 1948, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2—To see if the town will vote to dispense with the check list at this meeting.

Article 3—To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Article 4—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of common schools.

4: Budget Committee recommends \$6,000.00 to cover school expense only, no transportation included. (See Article 27 for transportation.)

Article 5—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for High School tuition.

5: Budget Committee recommends \$3000.00.

Article 6—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs and insurance on school buildings.

6: Budget Committee recommends \$2000.00 to cover urgently needed repairs.

Article 7—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for free text books.

7: Budget Committee recommends \$300.00.

Article 8—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for school supplies.

8: Budget Committee recommends \$300.00.

Article 9—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the salary of Superintendent of Schools.

9: Budget Committee recommends \$250.00.

Article 10—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of roads and bridges.

10: Budget Committee recommends \$4000.00 and carrying over. \$842.64 unexpended in 1947.

Article 11—To see what sum of money shall be paid to the road commissioners per day for their services, and fix the price per hour to be paid for labor on highways.

11: No recommendation by Budget Committee.

Article 12—To see what sum of money the town will raise for State Aid road construction, (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways/and bridges), under the prov-

isions of Sections 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R. S. 1944, as amended.

12: Budget Committee recommends \$799.50.

Article 13—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to cut and destroy bushes, to comply with Chapter 145, Public Laws, and if so how much.

13: Budget Committee recommends over \$256.86 unexpended in 1947.

Article 14—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to tar the section of the Downing Road constructed by Maine Turnpike, and if so, how much.

14: No recommendation from Budget Committee as cost estimates were not available.

Article 15—To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the removal of snow.

15: Budget Committee recommends \$2000.00.

Article 16—To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to purchase necessary new equipment for snow removal, funds to be taken from the unappropriated surplus, and how much.

16: Budget Committee recommends purchase not to exceed \$1100.00.

Article 17—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for contingent fund.

17. Budget Committee recommends \$2000.00.

Article 18—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to enlarge the present office downstairs in Town Hall.

18: Budget Committee recommends \$300.00 provided 1948 selectmen will use the office.

Article 19—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay for the collection of Excise taxes.

19: Budget Committee recommends \$50.00.

Article 20—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay for the collection of taxes.

20: Budget Committee recommends 1 1/2%.

Article 21—To see if the Town will vote to procure the services of a public school nurse as recommended by public health, Maine Laws of 1925 section 58, Chapter 140, Public Laws of 1925. \$75.00 was raised in 1947 but not expended.

21: Budget Committee recommends that this appropriation be transferred to Appropriation covered by Article 23.

Article 22—To see what sum the town will vote to raise for the support of poor.

22: Budget Committee recommends \$1000.00.

Article 23—To see if the town will vote to raise \$475.00 for the services of the public health nurse.

23: Budget Committee recommends \$475.00 for 1948— \$75 transferred from Article 21 to be used to cover nurse's services in 1947.

Article 24—To see if the town will vote that for the purpose of procuring a temporary loan to and for the use of the Town of North Kennebunkport, to pay the indebtedness of said town, due or to become due during the present municipal year, to be paid out of the money raised by taxation during the present municipal year, the town treasurer be and hereby is authorized and directed to borrow from time to time

a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate ten thousand dollars, and to execute and deliver the note or notes of the town, thereof, signed by the Town Treasurer and countersigned by the municipal officers of the Town.

24: Budget Committee recommends this article be approved.

Article 25—To see if the town will authorize the treasurer of the Town (with the approval of the Board of Selectmen) to sell and dispose of all tax titles held by Town on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.

25: Budget Committee recommends this article be approved.

Article 26—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$600 for services of out-of-town fire companies.

26: Budget Committee recommends \$600.00.

Article 27—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for transportation of school children.

27: Since no transportation is included in Article 4, common schools, budget committee recommends \$2000.00.

Article 28—To see if the Town will vote to separate the office of Treasurer from office of Tax Collector to be effective at next annual town meeting.

28: Budget Committee recommends separation.

Article 29—To see what the town wishes to do in regard to the October forest fire. The town is not compelled by law to pay more than one per cent of it's assessed valuation of the current year.

29; No recommendation by Budget Committee.

Article 30—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise toward retiring the principle of loan procured as our share of the Hutchins bridge.

30: Budget Committee recommends \$900.00.

Article 31—To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources advantage and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of Revised Statutes of Maine.

31: Budget Committee recommends no appropriation.

Article 32—To see if the town will raise the salary of Selectmen and how much.

32: Budget Committee recommends that in addition to present salaries, selectmen be paid
\$5.00 per diem for assessing in accordance with State law, with a maximum of 15 days pay in any fiscal year.

Article 33—To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to carry out last year's vote in regards to the repair of Durell's Bridge.

33: Budget Committee recommends approval.

Article 34—To act on any further business that may come before this meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting, for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.
