Report of the Public Health Nurse

Once again it is time to review the accomplishments of the past year. One of the objectives of the nursing service is to promote the independence of the family in dealing with its own health problems. Health teaching and guidance, nursing care of the sick, control of environental hazards to health are inseparable components of total family care. Through community participation and interest a great deal has been accomplished but much remains to ba done.

During 1956 much effort has been made to protect as many as possible against polio. Free vaccine was first provided for all children from 5-14. The first clinic was held in January and 104 children received their 1st shot. As more vaccine was available it was offered to all from birth to age 20. In July it was first offered at C.H.C. and the response was good. The vaccine was released for 3rd shots in December and 82 children were given booster shots. A period of 7 months should elapse before 3rd shots are given. The age group from 14-20 is still the less well protected group.

Child Health Conferences are held on the 2nd Tuesday of each month between 3-5 p.m. from May through October. I will include the attendance since 1947.

Periodic visits have bean made to the schools to assist the teachers with health problems. With the use of the puretone audiometer it is now possible to check the hearing of pupils in lower grades. One hundred thirty-six children were tested and 5 were found to have some type of hearing difficulty. Parents were noticed of these findings and advised to see their family physician.

Home visits have been made at the request of families and whenever any special help could be given.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank all those who have helped in various ways to make the program a success. Without their loyal support our problems would be very much increased.

I am especially grateful to the selectmen, health officer, superintendent of schools, teaching staff, and last but not least to the members of the Community and Health group who have furnished volunteer help in so many activities With your continued interest I hope the program can be further expanded m 1957. It is a challenge and a pleasure to serve you.

PROGRESS REPORT ON MOUTH HEALTH PROJECT

During October 1956 the elementary and preschool children again participated in a mouth health education and dental decay prevention project for which a registered dental hygienist from the Department of Health and Welfare was engaged.

The basic principles of mouth care were taught to approximately 71 children; 71 received mouth examinations, and 52 commenced topical applications of sodium fluoride solution for decay prevention, nearly all completing the full series of four applications.

We have been fortunate in obtaining a good staff of teachers. An improved salary scale has helped in this respect. During the past year the schools have operated with a minimum of difficulty. In June 1956 we had four teachers retire. I wish to call attention particularly to the long years of service of Mrs. Grace L. Smith and Miss Mildred L. Day. They served this Town long and well. Their good influence over large numbers of children can never be measured. They were dedicated school teachers.

Reports from high schools where North Kennebunkport children are attending school, indicate that most children are meeting with good success, and many are doing exceptional work.

The nursing service was of great value again this year. The dental and polio clinics were conducted according to schedule.

I wish to call attention to the Jacob's Report to the State Legislature which proposes reorganization of school districts, State subsidy and teachers' salary scale. Citizens should follow this proposed legislation closely as it will effect local school organization and finance, if passed.

I am still hoping the time will come when we can have a new consolidated school. The possibility that federal aid for construction may be available, seems to be more promising than in some years. It is not necessary for me to explore again the need for new facilities as I believe all citizens are convinced that we should have a modern school. The problem is one of finance and I hope that ways and means can be devised in the not too distant future.

I wish to thank the School Committee, teachers and parents for their continued cooperation.

Air Raid Instructions

Published by the Federal Civil Defense Administration

ALERT SIGNAL

A steady blast of 3 to 5 minute on sirens, whistles, horns, or similar devices.

WHAT TO DO

Tune your AM radio to a Conelrad station (640 or 1240 kc) for emergency instructions.

Know your local civil defense emergency plans. Obey police and civil defense instructions.

DO NOT USE THE TELEPHONE.

DO NOT become panicky if your radio is silent for a short time. This is necessary to switch to emergency broadcasting frequencies.

TAKE COVER SIGNAL

Wailing tone or short blasts for 3 minutes on sirens, whistles, horns, or similar devices.

WHAT TO DO

AT HOME: Get into your home shelter immediately. If you have none, shut all outdoor doors and windows and take cover in the basement or an interior first-floor room.

OUTDOORS: Seek the best available cover.

STAY PUT until you get word to come out.

IMPORTANT: If you see a bright flash of light, take cover instantly.

WARRANT

FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING MARCH 4, 1957

To ELSIE BURGESS, Constable of the Town of North

Kennebunkport, in said county:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of North Kennebunkport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall, in said Town on the fourth day of March, 1957 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the check list at this meeting.
- Art. 3. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

BUSINESS SESSION, 7:00 P. M.

- Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to carry forward the balance or overdraft on each account.
 - 4. Budget Committee recommends adoption of this article.
- Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to credit the Contingent Account with sums of money received, such as Bank Stock Tax, Dog License Refund, Cost and Interest on Taxes, Supplemental Taxes and Licenses; and to charge the Contingent Account with Discounts and Abatement of Taxes.
 - 5. Budget Committee recommends adoption of this article.
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by assessment for fire protection.
 - 6. Budget Committee recommends that no money be raised.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by assessment for the service of a nurse.

7. Budget Committee recommends \$1.420.00.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by assessment the sum of \$21.305.00 for the support of Public Schools to be distributed approximately as follows:

Art. 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Town Treasurer to deposit in the Sinking Fund for the new school all the Excise Taxes accrued during the period from Jan. 15, 1956 to Jan. 15, 1957.

9. Budget Committee recommends adoption of this article.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by assessment for the contingent fund.

10. Budget Committee recommends \$3,500.00.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by assessment for the support of the poor.

11. Budget Committee recommends \$2,000.00.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by assessment for the repair of roads and bridges.

12. Budget Committee recommends \$4,000.00.

Art. 13 To see what sum of money shall be paid to the Road Commissioners per hour and fix the price per hour fur labor on highways.

13. Budget Committee recommends same as State wages.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Construction under the provisions of Sec. 25 and 29 Chap. 20 R. S. 1944 as amended.

14. Budget Committee recommends \$1,066.00.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by assessment the sum of \$552.00 to tar the improved section of the Mountain Road.

15. Budget Committee recommends \$552.00.

At 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by assessment for the collection of taxes.

16. Budget Committee recommends 1 1/2%.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by assessment for the collection of excise taxes.

17. Budget Committee recommends \$150.00.

Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize a 2% discount to all property taxes paid in full within thirty days of receiving bill.

18. Budget Committee recommends adoption of this article.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the collector of taxes to charge interest of 6% on all unpaid property taxes after Dec. 1st.

19. Budget Committee recommends adoption of this article.

Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote that for the purpose of procuring a temporary loan to and for the use of the Town of North Kennebunkport, to pay the

indebtedness of said Town, due or to become due during the present municipal year, to be paid out of money raised by taxation during the present municipal year. The Town Treasurer be and hereby is authorized and directed to borrow from time to time a sum or sums not to exceed in the aggregate: Ten Thousand Dollars, and to execute and deliver the note or notes of the Town therefore signed by the Town Treasurer and countersigned by the municipal Officers of the Town.

Art 21 To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer of the Town (with the approval of the Selectmen) to sell and dispose of all tax titles held by the Town, and the Town's interest in tax liens whether completely foreclosed or not, on such terms as the Selectmen deem advisable and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by assessment for the cutting-of bushes along roads.

22. Budget Committee recommends \$250.00 for upper end and \$50.00 for lower end.

Art. 23. To see if the Town will transfer the balance on hurricane damage account to Civilian Defense fund.

23. Budget Committee recommends adoption of this article.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by assessment the sum of \$100.00 for Civilian Defense.

24. Budget Committee recommends \$100.00.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by assessment for the removal of snow.

25. Budget Committee recommends \$4,000.00.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by assessment to resurface and tar improved section of Sinnott Road.

Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to put the Smith property up for sale and request sealed bids for same.

Art. 28. To act on any further business that may be legally brought before this meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall at nine o'clock in the morning of the day of said meeting for the purpose of revising and correcting the lists of voters.
